An Overview

Philosophy is taken to be an abstract study about the fundamental structure of the world. Philosophy inculcates the habits of logical reasoning, avoiding fallacious reasoning, thinking more carefully about the place of each and every aspect of nature vis a vis the whole of nature.

A Philosophy student emerges as a critical thinker who accepts nothing at face value. The philosophy student will contribute to society through positive reflection about its various facets. In pursuing these aims, M.A. Philosophy Programme aims at developing the ability to think critically, logically and analytically and hence use philosophical reasoning in practical situations. Pursuing a degree in Philosophy will make students pursue interesting careers in media, education, law, politics, government etc.
